Chalazion of the upper eyelid: focal chronic inflammation of a meibomian gland. When chronic, incision and curettage through the conjunctiva is necessary

Multiple small chalazia



Chalazion pointing of the conjunctival side of the lower eye lid



Stye of the lower eyelid. The stye points at the root of a lash, while a chalazion points on the conjucntival side or on the skin side



Acute dacryocystitis (inflammation of the lacrimal sac) pointing on the skin side.



Entropion of the lower eye lid with trichiasis (more than 4 rubbing lashes)



Rubbing lashes of the upper eyelid
It causes severe discomfort, lacrimation and foreign body sensation



Mucocele: due to obstruction of the lower end of the nasolacrimal duct. The distended nasolacrimal sac fill with mucoid material




Mucocele: due to obstruction of the lower end of the nasolacrimal duct. The distended nasolacrimal sac fill with mucoid material



Orbital cellulitis: exophthalmos, fever, pain, soft tissue edema and restricted eye movements.

Commonly caused by Staphylococcus aures, Streptococcus and Haemophilus influenzae organism.

Herpes Zoster of the face respecting the midline

Acute inflammation of a dorsal root ganglion by varicella zoster virus.

Vesicular skin lesions, may be associated with a dendritic ulcer.

Corneal sensation is usually reduced due to ganglion damage.
